3 Matters arising from minutes of 9th May 2021

4 Elections

a) Deanery Synod

As Pam Davies has now joined General Synod her place has become available on Deanery Synod. Gill Browne-Townley was elected unopposed.

b) Members of PCC

Church representation rules state that the number of places available on PCCs should be in proportion to the number of people on the Electoral Roll which results in nine places this year. Gill Browne-Townley's place has also become available as she joins Deanery Synod and becomes ex-officio.

Nominations have been received from David Morley, David Taylor, Elsie Hollinrake and John Harrison. Three of the places will be for three years and one place for two years. Everyone agreed to let Fr Tony draw lots, the result of which was that John Harrison, Elsie Hollinrake and David Taylor will stand for three years and David Morley will stand for two years.

c) Independent Examiner for Accounts

d) Parish Representative on Deanery Pastoral Committee

e) Parish Representative on the Building Bridges Project

d. FABRIC, GOODS AND ORNAMENTS REPORT

ST. AUGUSTINE'S, AND ST. AIDAN'S

Delta Reach have attended to the guttering on the south elevation of the main church roof at St Augustine's. They discovered blockages in the guttering and downspouts which have been cleared and they have applied sealant to the guttering joints. This has prevented further water ingress into church and they have recommended annual checks after autumn. We are arranging for Delta Reach to return and to repair and clear guttering and facia boards on the north elevation.

At St Aidan's the local gutter repairer has cleared and repaired gutters and again we plan to arrange an annual check and maintenance work on the small flat roof area over the playground entrance.

e. BOLTON DEANERY SYNOD REPORT

During 2022 the Bolton Deanery Synod continued to meet both in person and on Zoom. The deanery structure and its mission communities, following the major restructure across the Manchester Diocese a couple of years ago, are becoming more established and distinct.

The Revd Simon Cook has been in place as full-time Area Dean for the Bolton Deanery for two years, with Mr Keith Lewis as Lay Chair. One issue during 2022 was the narrowly-carried Deanery Synod's motion, seeking permission for the use of individual cups during Holy Commun-

ion. The motion was not approved at Diocesan Synod and so the issue went no further. We heard from a range of diocesan project leaders, including Children Changing Places (in its final year of the current format) and the Revd Grace Thomas, regarding the opportunity for parishes to engage with the Energy Footprint Tool.

We are part of Mission Community 4 which along-side us consists of: Farnworth, Kearsley and Stoneclough; Little Lever, St Matthew and Seven Saints, New Bury with Great Lever. Two of the four Mission Communities are still without designated leaders and there are yet to be regular meetings within MC4..

This was the final year of the current 'round' of parish representatives. Our reps until the 2023 APCM are Gill Browne-Townley, Margaret Mullen & Linda Parkington, along with Fr Tony. In addition, Pam Davies is ex-officio on Deanery Synod due to her place on General Synod.

f. PARISH SAFEGUARDING CO-ORDINATOR

REPORT TO THE APCM OF ST AUGUSTINE'S TONGE MOOR

REPORT TO THE APCM OF ST AUGUSTINE, TONGE MOOR (07/05/23)

The P.C.C. adopted The Church of England, Diocese of Manchester document 'Parish Safeguarding Handbook... promoting a safer church.' (Published October 2018).

The document refers to Best Practice and states that Best Practice is the responsibility of everyone, not just those who work with children and young people. This means that as a congregation we should support our leaders in whatever way we can but particularly by not allowing leaders to place themselves in vulnerable situations.



Actions already implemented:

- All P.C.C. members, Sunday School teachers, the organist and the church warden checked and cleared by the CCPAS
 (Churches' Child Protection Advisory Service) and now in possession of DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) Certificates
 and have signed a self-declaration Form,
- P.C.C. MEMBERS, Sunday school teachers, the organist and church wardens have received a copy of: 'The Good Practice guidelines' The Parish Policy Statement and The Parish Safeguarding Handbook.
- Most members of the P.C.C. & Sunday School/Messy Church Leaders have successfully completed Basic Awareness Online Safeguarding Training and The Foundation Training Level.
- Churchwarden & Safeguarding Leader have completed Leadership Training. Further training is planned for Clergy and Lay Ministers.
- Name and phone number of Parish Safeguarding Officer appears in church magazine and on posters.
- ChildLine and NSPCC posters and information cards displayed in the church and Parish Hall.
- Safer recruitment & Safeguarding Training attended by Safeguarding Officer.

- Safe-guarding is a regular item on the PCC agenda.
- Information, regarding Safe-guarding and policies, is on the Church website/Facebook.

Actions to be addressed:

- Review policy statements at Annual Parochial Church meeting.
- Safeguarding Training to be completed by all members of the P.C.C.; Sunday school and Messy Church leaders & Church Warden (s) and renewed every 3 years.
- Send recommendations, policy statement, to any new leaders/helpers in Sunday School, P.C.C. and church wardens. Applicants to apply for DBS certificates and complete Basic and Foundation Online Safeguarding Training.
- DBS certificates to be renewed every 3 years from January 2023.
- Attend any Safeguarding Training Courses which take place throughout the year.
- A second Safeguarding Recruiter needs to be appointed.

Finally, I would like to say that having Safeguarding Children and Adults at Risk Policies does not guarantee abuse will never happen here, but it does provide another hurdle which perpetrators need to cross before gaining access to children and vulnerable adults at St. Augustine's.

g. SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Our Sunday School retire to the Parish Hall on Sundays, during the Mass, after the collect. On the second Sunday of the month the children remain in church for the Family Service.

The Sunday School teaching is based on the gospel for the week and is planned around the Church Union Foundations which can be viewed on line. The session includes a chat explaining the gospel, prayer and an activity/worksheet.

The number of children attending varies greatly from 2 to 15 which does make for difficulties with continuity of teaching, but the children attending appear to enjoy the session and participate willingly. The Sunday School originally had 9 Sunday School teachers, but for various reasons numbers have fallen to one, so we rely on the parents who come down with their younger children.

h. BIBLE-STUDY GROUP

The Bible Study Group began in March 2022 when a group of worshippers expressed a desire to discuss and learn more from the Bible in an informal and casual setting.

Our opening meetings discussed our favourite hymns and passages from Psalms, before we jointly chose a book from the Bible to split into fortnightly sessions for reading and discussion.

We began with the Letter of James in the New Testament before moving on to The Acts of the Apostles.

Initially we alternated between Monday afternoon and evenings, but it soon became clear that everyone could attend 7.30pm Monday so we changed to evenings only.

By studying 2 or 3 chapters from Acts at each session, we followed the progress of The Apostles and growth of Christianity after Jesus' Ascension until Paul finally arrives in Rome.

In January this year we began our study of Isaiah, who lived around 750BC and prophesised the coming of The Messiah, 700 years before Jesus' birth. Isaiah is sometimes called the "Fifth Gospel" and we have greatly enjoyed learning of his life and the turbulent times around Israel and the Middle East. We

get to the end of Isaiah in June and will shortly choose our next bible study for that time. Why not join us

at any or all of our sessions, which start with refreshments and a prayer and are generally over by 9pm. You will be most welcome. Monthly sessions are advertised on notice boards and in the Parish Magazine.

i. MESSY CHURCH

We decided to focus on "Skills for my Future" as a theme for our first term. There are different stages of badge work for this theme, so we started with stage 2. The skills we covered ranged from DIY (how to use a screwdriver and a hammer) to cooking skills and money management. A highlight was when we spent a couple of weeks hammering nails into a block of wood and making a heart shaped ornament. Several of our members completed their languages interest badge. Our badge night at the end of term was busy as every Brownie earned a badge of some sort for their efforts.

As we progressed through the year, we shifted the focus for our meetings onto encouraging interests and looking at world events and our well-being. We spent time learning about Earth Day and the environment. As part of this we completed the Grow Your Own badge with a competition with prizes on who could grow the tallest sunflower.

A highlight of our year was the Queens Platinum Jubilee. We had a big party, and everyone was issued with the official badge from Girl Guiding. We made cupcakes and crowns, played games, and made memories. Little did we realise that we would return to Brownies at the start of the new term in

September with a new monarch. One of our Brownies took her Promise the first week back after the summer term and was the first Brownie in our County to take her Promise to the King and not the Queen. We made the county newsletter with this news. We also spent some time on our first week of the September term making a memory jar and lighting a candle in church for the Queen. It was a good opportunity to think about and discuss loss.

After our months of learning new skills for our future we decided to spend our Autumn term expressing ourselves through art. We made art in the style of pointillism, monster models, Christmas decorations and built dens. After a request from one of our Brownies we spent a meeting blind tasting different flavours of crisps to test our palettes. One of the Sixes managed to detect the cinnamon taste of the Christmas flavour crisps we found. Every year we use Bonfire night to look at fire and firework safety. The girls practise striking a match safely and we enjoy sparklers outside.

We finished the year as we always do with a Christmas party, Promise Ceremony and the award of badges earned during the term. We ended the year with 21 Brownies. We have 2 regular warranted Leaders and Pam, our Unit Helper. Ruth manages our accounts and helps us out at meetings when she can. As our pack continues to grow, we need to look at finding more help to manage and develop our unit. We have much to look forward to in 2023.

At the end of 2022, our Cell membership within the Society of Our Lady of Walsingham stood at 24.

Our five day parish pilgrimage to Walsingham celebrated the 75thanniversary of the first pilgrimage from Tonge Moor in 1947. Bunting across the Milner Wing balcony railings welcomed us and left other pilgrims and visitors in no doubt of our unique record and '75' theme. During our time at the Shrine we followed our usual itinerary, including prayers and thanksgivings from those who were unable to join us. We put flowers by Doris' bench in the garden tower in memory of all our past pilgrims and we followed in the footsteps of the 1947 pilgrims by having



our Wednesday afternoon outing in Cromer. We had a jolly Thursday Evening Social when we were pleased to be joined by Sr Carol. Each member of our Cell received a small booklet giving details of the early years of our pilgrimages and we featured in the Assumption-tide copy of the *Walsingham Review* with photographs, facts about the 1947 visit and a summary of our Cell today.

We paid the annual cost for our parish candle which burns in the Holy House and following an appeal for contributions towards the urgent repair of the sign hanging from Stella Maris over the Holt Road, we gave a contribution from our Cell funds.

We joined together for Mass and Devotions on Feasts of Our Lady, including refreshments and social time afterwards. A small number of us travelled to Walsingham for the National Pilgrimage in May and a good number attended the Centenary Festival in Blackburn Cathedral in June. In July, a significant number of us took advantage of the wi-fi in the parish hall and followed the live-stream of the Centenary Mass from the Shrine Church. In October we welcomed Fr Ben Bradshaw, the current Shrine Priest, as the preacher at our Walsingham Festival. News both from the Shrine and the Priory of Our Lady have been regularly included in our parish magazine.

Members of the Cell will have done their best to say the Angelus daily and fulfil the obligation to attend Mass on the Feasts of Our Lady, either by being in church or at home through our live-streaming. The intention for the last Saturday in the month's 10am Mass continued to be for those who lead the worship and ministries at the Shrine, its Priests Associate and all pilgrims.

We look forward to continuing our regular Cell meetings in 2023.


