

Dear friends

In my Report to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on May 15th, I referred to the increasing shortage of priests in the Church of England. In part, this is due to the bulge of priests born in the late-50s who are coming up for retirement: fewer new priests are being ordained than are retiring, thus the national shortage.

Furthermore, the Diocese of Manchester, in common with other dioceses, is struggling financially, a situation made worse by the prohibition of communal worship during the pandemic lockdowns and the resultant lack of income from collections, which go towards paying for clergy. Many clergy throughout the Church of England have responsibility for more than one parish - some have more than a dozen! Society parishes such as ours are not immune from the effects of the shortage of clergy, and some of our priests already have the care of multiple parishes.

The nearest Society parish to Tonge Moor is St Matthew's, Little Lever, and it has been intimated for some time that it would be extremely unlikely that either parish would be granted its own priest without him having another role or responsibility.

Because of this, there has been an informal understanding between St Matthew's parish priest, Fr John Wiseman, and I that when one of us leaves or retires, the other will take on responsibility for his parish. Fr John has announced that he is to retire in November, so (subject to more formal conversations taking place) it is likely that I will be looking after St Little Lever as well as Tonge Moor.

This will necessitate some changes in both parishes, not least as I cannot be in two places at once. We will need to reconsider our mass times, and accept that I will have to split my time during the week between the two parishes.

In the meantime, it would be good for us to get to know each other, for example by issuing invitations to each other's events and sharing in those events.

Please pray for the parishes of Tonge Moor and Little Lever, their priests and people, as we begin to work together to shape our shared futures.

# **CHURCH ELECTIONS**

Congratulations to Ruth Taylor, who was elected Churchwarden at our Meeting of Parishioners on Sunday 15th May, to Gill Browne-Townley who was elected to Deanery Synod, and to John Harrison, Elsie Hollinrake and David Taylor who were elected to the Parochial Church Council.

At its first meeting, which followed immediately afterwards, the PCC appointed John Harrison, Linda Parkington, Ken Fisher and Barbara Davis as Sidespeople and Fr David Schofield an Assistant Sidesman. Charles Nzeh, was admitted to the Electoral Roll after the APCM and will be appointed a Sidesman at the PCC's meeting on Tuesday 31st May.

All Churchwardens are Officers of the Bishop, and are required to attend an Archdeacon's Visitation to be admitted to Office: likewise Sidespeople, who are the Churchwardens' assistants. The nearest Visitation is at St Peter's Bolton on Wednesday 15th June at 7.30pm. If any Sidespeople cannot attend this (the last in the series) alternative dates and venues are pinned to the church door.

Access to St Aidan's will not be affected except from the areas to the south of Thicketford Road. Travel westwards will not be affected, and there will be a crossing point on Thicketford Road at Tonge Moor Road to allow travel northwards up Tonge Moor Road. The return journey would be via Harwood and New Lane and Winchester Way.

Access to St Augustine's can be gained from the north either via Harwood and New Lane/Winchester Way or coming down the A666 to Bradford Street/Bury Road and up Ainsworth Lane.

### WALSINGHAM NEWS



The 2022 Pilgrimage season at the Shrine has got off to a good start. Having experienced it several times before, for me the week-end of Low Sunday always seems to have that 'new term' feeling of

excitement and anticipation - particularly so this year as confidence with being away from home, travelling and being with others is growing. It is a great joy, if you are fortunate enough, to be part of the first Wednesday Candlelight Procession of the Image of Our Lady of Walsingham and the Sunday afternoon Procession of the Blessed Sacrament of the year. Many parish groups will be making their way to England's Nazareth in the coming months, a good number of whom haven't been since 2019. The Shrine is being very pro-active with developing a network of Cell contacts to keep us all in touch more and also with contacting parishes which haven't been to the Shrine in recent vears. The Festival at Exeter Cathedral at the end of May was a great success and of course we are eagerly anticipating the Festival at Blackburn Cathedral on 18<sup>th</sup> June. We still have tickets and places on our coach so if you know someone who doesn't know much about Walsingham and all it stands for, why not invite them along and let them find out?

Our own pilgrims have now paid their 2<sup>nd</sup> deposit and filled in their accommodation form so we know the weeks until the end of August are ticking down! A gentle reminder that the balance is due by the end of July.

Huge thanks to Fr Tony and Pam for sharing the drive, which allowed a small group of us to travel down to the National Day Pilgrimage on the first Monday in May. We joined Ken, who was already down there; Mary who lives locally and joins us during our visit in August and Sheila from Chesterfield (who along with her husband Andy and Molly their dog) has joined us in recent years, too. The weather was absolutely brilliant and it was wonderful to see so many pilgrims there after the 2020 and 2021 gaps. I have it on the best of authority (because I asked the right person!) that between 1,500 and 2,000 pilgrims made it. In the words of the hymn, 'Lo, from the



North they come, from East and West and South.' (Note to Fr Tony - we don't seem to have sung that for a while...) Bishop Philip's homily was outstanding and inspiring (when isn't it?) and worth every moment of the long day.

Sr Angela is 80 at the beginning of this month and although the Sisters celebrate Profession Anniversaries, being that significant age is rather special. A card was sent from us all, with our love, prayers and best wishes. Sr Carol recently attended a conference with other Religious to talk about spreading the Gospel in a digital age. I'm part of a group of Associates of the Priory who 'meet' through Zoom every Friday evening and also in St Margaret's Associates Reflecting Together (SMART) which is a Facebook Group, both led by Sr Carol. She may wear a habit and veil and be part of a 'Traditional Anglican Community' formed in the 1850's but there are aspects of her life which are very 21<sup>st</sup> Century!

Not Walsingham but with a pilgrimage theme, several of us went to Ladyewell, near Preston. Again, a two year gap since the last time and describing the conditions of the two years before that as 'inclement' would be an understatement. However it was well worth the wait, with glorious sunshine and a really enjoyable, spiritual day. Our Walsingham Cell meets on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> June at 7.30pm for Mass and Rosary, followed by light refreshments. As always, this is open to everyone.

My dear Nephew Darren

This has been an unusual month: we have moved from hysterical excitement to deep disappointment within the space of days.



For many years, our vestry has displayed an oil painting generously donated by the Dowager Duchess of Stansby – given to us, I suspect, because her son, the tenth Duke, would not allow it in his house. It was supposed to depict Daniel in the lions' den, although I always thought it looked more like a prospective adopter visiting a dog rescue centre. The Dowager was less than pleased when it wasn't made the centrepiece in the sanctuary, but we managed to persuade her that her exceptional work of art would be safer from theft if locked away.

Then - our cleaner happened to knock it off the wall. If it had landed in her bucket of disinfectant and been totally destroyed, it would have been a sadness I suspect I could have learned to bear. But something more interesting happened. Some of the Dowager's oil was chipped off – to reveal a painting underneath of what looked like a cherub.

The cleaner told the churchwarden, who instructed her not to tell anyone about the find. This inevitably meant that, within the hour, the entire parish knew of the discovery of what had already been transformed into a priceless pre-Raphaelite treasure. Our churchwarden has yet to learn the fact that if you tell someone something in complete confidence, they assume it means they can only tell one other person at a time. By evening, mutually opposed camps had already formed. Miss Timmins wanted the treasure to be placed in a side chapel, as a shrine, preferably with candles permanently burning beside it.
